Getting to Know.... Mike and Sandria Dixon

"This is our date day," says Sandria Dixon about her and her husband Mike spending Sundays at St. Philomena. "We date every Sunday."

"We really date seven days a week," adds Mike.

"I date two men on Sunday," Sandria continues. "Him and the Lord. It's always been that way with us."

The two met more than six decades ago, when Mike was seventeen and Sandria had just turned sixteen, Catholic Church playing a big part.

"I was in a buddy's car and she was walking down the street," Mike remembers, "I seen her face and I told him, 'I'm going to meet her' and I went to church that Sunday and, lo and behold..."

"There I was," Sandria finishes the story.

"There she was," says Mike.

The two met at St. Adelbert's but their journey is filled with twists and turns. Mike Dixon's family moved from North Carolina to Cleveland when he was nine and Sandria Epps came to Cleveland from Alabama to join her father when she was thirteen. They met as teenagers, dated, even got engaged before Sandria went to college. But then their paths went separate directions.

"The one thing that keeps me centered is my faith," Mike says. "If I didn't have any faith, I'd be in jail today."

Sandria and Mike went their separate ways, each having a family with two children, each getting divorced before getting back together when Sandria, who had moved back to Alabama, returned to Cleveland for her aunt's funeral, eventually living in her aunt's Cleveland Heights home.

"I prayed for us to get back together," remembers Sandria. "Mike was always in my heart and in my mind and I asked God. 'Please, if you can find a way to get us back together, please do.' And he did.

The couple got married on Sandria's birthday in 1997 and have been at St. Philomena for 29 years. They're a blended family, Mike has girls now 47 and 51 (Monica and Dana) and Sandria has a boy and a girl the exact same ages (Robert and Tashena) with six grandkids between them, five girls and a boy, spread out from South Carolina to Columbus to Los Angeles. They even moved to California to help with a granddaughter before moving back to Cleveland Heights.

"The kids she have and I have, I love 'em all," says Mike. "You don't have to be blood to love somebody."

"It was like a fairy tale to me," Sandria says of her relationship. "It was just a joy for the Lord to bring him back in my life. I prayed for that."

"The thing that keeps you together is to be a friend first," Sandria adds.

But the real secret to their marriage:

"We have three TVs in the house," says Mike.

"We're one in Christ," corrects Sandria.

"I don't think I really would change a thing," Mike says about their long and winding road. We learned a lot."
